The Guardian (1821-2003) and its sister paper, *The Observer* (1791-2003), both part of the ProQuest Historical Newspapers™ program, give readers online access to facts, firsthand accounts, and opinions of the day about the most significant and fascinating political, business, sports, literary, and entertainment events from the past two centuries. From Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo to the Russian Revolution to Nelson Mandela's release from prison, these British historical newspapers bring history to life for researchers.

The Guardian and *The Observer* have reputations for fearless reporting and controversial opinions. *The Guardian* was first published in response to the Peterloo Massacre. Originally known as the *Manchester Guardian*, it was a Saturday-only paper until the newspaper stamp duty was repealed in 1855. Businessmen who hated its progressive opinions would tear the paper in half, throw the commentary out the train window, and only read the portion containing stock prices.

The Observer, the world's oldest Sunday paper, was first published in 1791. Thought-provoking writers such as George Orwell, Vita Sackville-West, Clive James, Philip Toynbee, and others were contributors, continuing a tradition of freedom of the press and providing serious coverage of politics and literature.

 - Print, download, and share articles and images in PDF format.

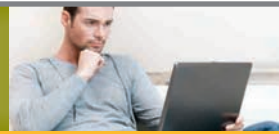

Searches can be confined to 20 specific article types and dates to focus on the most relevant information. Each newspaper page is zoned into article images, and each newspaper image is supported with searchable ASCII text. Combined, these features mean faster, more effective searches for users. ProQuest digitizes documents at a high resolution to deliver clean, readable images, and highlighted search terms focus readers on the most relevant content.

Researchers can sort their results by oldest, most recent, or most relevant. In addition, articles that originally spanned multiple pages of a newspaper are “threaded” together, appearing as one continuous image and improving readability. Users can view and easily download articles, front pages, photos, display ads, and more in PDF format. The “My Research” summary feature can be used to track recent searches, save articles, email documents, create a bibliography, export citations, and create Web pages.
